



There is a toilet block on this very dog friendly, flat, and open site with resident Alpacas and chickens and far-reaching views to the Marlborough Downs. A very peaceful and tranquil spot. We will be having a Social get together on Saturday evening and a Coffee morning on Sunday

This has been a very popular weekend meet site. This is situated in a beautiful designated AONB area with plenty of places of interest in the local area, including walks along the Kennett and Avon Canal from the village, the impressive Caen Locks in the nearby Medieval market town of Devizes, Avebury Stone Circle, the market town of Marlborough, or walks on the Marlborough Downs. The Barge Inn at Honeystreet just a 25-minute stroll along the canal from the village, as well as a lovely canal side cafe There is very good pub and shop in the local village of All Cannings

Directions: - From A303 at Andover west take A342 signposted Devizes/Marlborough.

After passing through Ludgershall turn right at the Crown Public House. Follow road to T Junction, then left and immediately right to stay on A342. At Upavon - Take A342 towards Devizes, Continue A342 until sign posted turn on right to Patney / All Cannings. Follow through Patney village, over railway bridge, and turn to Little Owls Campsite is then approx 1 mile on the right. Follow yellow LDA signs at entrance to road leading to Little Owls. This is the best route to avoid narrow roads, but note final mile from the railway bridge to Little Owls turn is quite narrow, but with passing places.

Thruxton Race Event

The weekend of the 21st to the 24th of June saw Loddon DA make its annual trip to Thruxton Circuit for a weekend of camaraderie and motor sport.

For the last two years the DA has an attended event for classic cars, but this year's event saw a slight move further back in time and slightly later in the year to the very popular Thruxton Historic event.

As soon as registration opened at midday on the Friday the reserved site started to fill and by reasonably early on the Friday evening all the thirty-seven units were in position and enjoying a gloriously warm summer evening, a foretaste of the weather that was to remain very pleasant all weekend.

The units were of the normal mix of Motorhomes and Caravans but special mention must be made of one of the most spectacular trailer tents I certainly have ever seen.

Friday evening saw the sixty-nine guests (from thirteen different DA's) gather for the normal welcome, a short history lesson of Thruxton Circuit and also to receive information on the weekend's events, which as well as the motor racing included many displays and even a demonstration of American Nascar's.

Saturday morning saw the practice sessions for the various categories of single seater, sports cars and saloon cars that were to race over the weekend. With the start at nine a.m. sharp, I can't tell you how surprised I was to see some of the party scouting out their vantage point some one hour earlier than that.

As people returned to our site, which is situated behind a spectator bank adjacent to the circuit, it was obvious that a good day had been had by all. We had not arranged anything for the Saturday evening as the circuit had a live band playing outside the bar and restaurant which many guests had indicated they would like to attend.

Sunday again dawned bright but a lay in was possible as the on track activity didn't start until ten twenty to allow the local church to hold their morning service.

A great day's racing followed, marred only by a freak accident that halted the final race of the day. An errant wheel made its way through the air and landed in our area damaging my caravan awning and slight damage to a motorhome although the circuit personnel were soon on hand to ensure that everybody was OK and making the necessary arrangements. Nobody, including the drivers involved were injured, and at our evening drink and natter the consensus was that it was indeed a freak accident and shouldn't mar a great weekend. The talk rapidly turned back to the racing, the most popular race was for the mini's, although my favourite still remains as the Jochen Rindt Trophy race which featured a full grid of Formula Two, Formula Three, Formula Atlantic, Formula Four and Ford 2000 cars.

Monday morning saw the D A's customary final day coffee morning for those lucky souls that didn't have to rush off for work.

A great weekend spent in really good company, at a great event and all in the sunshine, what could be better.
